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1. Introduction

This document contains the 2007 Annual Implementation Report for the INTERACT Community Initiative Programme (CIP). It covers the period 1 January 2007 to 31 December 2007. It has been drafted in accordance with art. 37 of Council Regulation (EC) No 1260/1999 of 21 June 1999 laying down general provisions on the Structural Funds, with the Methodological Working Paper No 1 of the European Commission, (Vademecum for Structural Funds Plans and programming documents) and other guidelines provided by the European Commission.¹

The total budget for the INTERACT Programme is EUR 39.54 million, EUR 28.15 million of which is ERDF (according to Commission Decision C(2004) 5802 of 28 December 2004). The programme is managed by the Austrian Federal Chancellery (*Bundeskanzleramt der Republik Österreich*) with the support of the INTERACT Secretariat. The programme is steered by a Monitoring and Steering Committee made of representatives from 27 EU Member States as well as Norway and Switzerland.

2. General Conditions of Relevance to the Implementation of the Programme

INTERACT is an individual and institutional capacity building programme with a relatively straightforward theory of action. The programme aims to increase the effectiveness and efficiency of the INTERREG Community Initiative programmes. The conduit for INTERACT impulses is ultimately individuals, who participate in INTERACT events, read publications, access databases, etc, and, through this, develop their own capacities and those of their organisations.

The working environment has therefore always been deeply linked to the political and institutional trends and changes which were often originated by the European Institutions agenda. This was also the case in 2007 throughout the final stages of the planning and development of Cohesion Policy.

In this regard 2007 has represented a stepping stone as the kick-off year for the new generation of programmes which have been prepared and approved. The 2007 – 2013 European Cohesion Policy has been finally launched and the first programmes started to be operational during the second semester of the year. It this context the INTERACT Programme adapted its structure and its service delivery methodology in view of responding to growing needs and requests.

The most relevant fact in 2007 was the adoption of the **Fourth Report on Economic and Social Cohesion** by the European Commission on 30 May 2007. The document has provided an update on the progress made towards achieving economic, social and territorial cohesion, and on the manner in which Member States' and Community's policies have contributed to it.

The Report has given a first assessment of the preparation for 2007-2013, based on the programming documents submitted to the Commission by Member States by end of April 2007. It has finally looked at the new challenges which will add up to the context for regional development in the next 20-30 years - such as demography, climate change, social exclusion or energy - and submits for a debate a series of questions on their combined impact on the policy. The long-term purpose of this report is to launch the reflection on the future of Europe's policy to promote greater economic, social and territorial cohesion and to foster regional development and competitiveness.

In this context reference is very often made to good management and excellence in the delivery of programmes. Therefore the INTERACT programme in 2007 has naturally adapted its interventions and supported INTERREG stakeholders in the first steps of the launching phase. The programme has been working in an overlapping condition with issues pertinent both to the new programming period as well as the closing and winding-up of the 2000 - 2006 programmes.



3. Progress in the Implementation of Priorities and Measures

The INTERACT Programme has been successfully delivered during 2007 by reaching a higher number of INTERREG stakeholders than previous years and becoming more and more known as the training and exchange of information tool on issues related to European Territorial Cooperation. Overall the level of communication increased with the members of the Monitoring and Steering Committee, the Points and Projects and in general with representatives of the various programmes. At each stage of the programme's development, clear and detailed information has been provided highlighting both successes and bottlenecks in view of sharing a common strategy. Overall Points and Projects delivered outputs that met the programme's targets.

In 2007 the programme continued its approach to project development and targeted more partners at regional and local level as well as developed new modules focusing on the preparation of the new generation of programmes (2007 – 2013). As a consequence of the revision of the INTERACT Programme Complement made in mid 2006 the programme benefited in 2007 from a new intervention under Priority 1 Measure 1 which supported extra activities of capitalisation of INTERREG III results. Several training events have been organised throughout Europe by the INTERACT Points and Projects. Many events have been organised in cooperation with the European Commission and some National Ministries² responsible for Regional Policy.

It is worthwhile mentioning also that in 2007 all INTERREG Programmes of the three different Strands took part in INTERACT events or used INTERACT ad hoc services and management tools. In 2007 INTERACT involved more and more professionals responsible for First and Second level Control a structured networks around these groups of professionals. These people joined the traditional INTERACT users generally operating in the Joint Technical Secretariats, the Managing Authorities and Paying Authorities as well as being representatives in Monitoring and Steering Committees.

Special emphasis was also given to services tailored for the new EU member States (Bulgaria and Romania) as well as for the ENPI component of Territorial Cooperation at the External Borders of the European Union. Some activities have also been planned in cooperation with DG Relex and DG EuropAid of the European Commission.

This chapter of the 2007 Annual implementation report introduces the progress made by Points and Projects and reports on their specific targets, gives an overview of the main events delivered, on some occasions in cooperation with National and Regional institutions. Finally it presents the INTERACT Communications Strategy as implemented by the use of tools (website, communications system, etc.) and actions (events, promotional campaigns, etc.).

For the sake of complete information for readers the following section presents the programme's Priorities and Measures per financial allocation and context of intervention.

3.1 The INTERACT Programme Structure

The INTERACT Programme is structured into four priorities:

- Priority 1: Management Support total EUR 15 139 555, ERDF EUR 13 625 599 (38% of total budget, 48% of ERDF allocation)
- Priority 2: INTERREG Development: Local and Regional Initiatives total EUR 14 076 036, ERDF EUR 7 038 018 (36% of total budget, 25% of ERDF allocation)
- Priority 3: Management of Transition and External Cooperation total EUR 8 257 940, ERDF EUR 7 038 018 € (21% of total budget, 20% of ERDF allocation)
- Priority 4: Technical Assistance total EUR 2 064 485, ERDF EUR 1 858 036 (5% of total budget, 7% of ERDF allocation)

The two measures in Priority 3 provide for broadly the same activities as Priorities 1 and 2 respectively, but with an ad hoc focus on the Member States that jointed EU in 2004, the two new Member States (Bulgaria and Romania as from January 2007) and the external cooperation at the Eastern and Southern borders of the European Union, effectively making this dimension of the programme more visible.

Priority 1 and Priority 3 Measure 1 are focused on 'INTERREG management support' – assisting INTERREG programmes in their practical implementation and management. The services and resources under this heading are delivered by four INTERACT Points which are coordinated by the INTERACT Programme Secretariat.

Under Priority 1 Measure 1 the intervention called "Capitalisation of INTERREG III results towards the new programmes under European Territorial Cooperation (ETC)" aims at capitalising on the experience and know-how achieved in all three strands of the INTERREG III Community Initiative.

Priority 2 and Priority 3 Measure 2 complement the work of the INTERACT Points through INTERACT Projects which were selected via two calls for proposals³. INTERACT Projects were set up by groups of regions and other eligible players⁴ in view of deepening INTERACT activities also for some specific stakeholders (e.g. sparsely populated regions, maritime cooperation regions, etc...), and to provide potential benefits to a wider INTERREG audience.

A wider target group could apply under these measures than under Priority 1, including national, regional and local authorities and public equivalent bodies able to take full responsibility for the administration and spending of public funds.

3.2 Overall Summary of Events in the INTERACT Programme in 2007

The INTERACT Programme aims to increase the effectiveness of INTERREG by linking the whole European INTERREG community and offering chances to exchange experiences and discussing relevant issues faced daily by programme managers. The individuals are in the end the target of INTERACT actions as they participate in INTERACT events, read publications, access databases, etc, and, through this, develop their own capacities and those of their organisations.

In 2007 INTERACT continued its action of support by opening up several opportunities throughout Europe and closely involving INTERACT users in the development of relevant resources and the organisation of cooperation activities. Programmes from the three Strands of INTERREG became closer and closer both in their own Strand as well as within other types of cooperation and areas.

The needs and the priorities have been increasingly identified together with the INTERREG programmes and so the activities have been planned. Therefore in comparison to previous years the calendar of INTERACT events and services has been drafted in conjunction with INTERACT users. In this regard the programme managers (Secretariat and Points) denoted a great flexibility and capacity of adaptation. At the same great support was provided by the Managing Authority and the Monitoring and Steering Committee.

Once again INTERACT activities contributed to improving individuals' knowledge and skills as well as to bring about organisational changes which collectively mean that INTERREG programming becomes more effective.

The tables below highlight various types of interventions (seminars, conferences, etc...) on different themes (e.g. Lead Partner principle, project and programme closure, new institutional settings under 2007 – 2013 programmes, INTERREG Project ideas generation, etc...) and list the main INTERACT events delivered by the Programme actors directly and/or in cooperation with other European and/or National institutions/organisations. The main internal management meetings are also marked. In the course of 2007 the INTERACT Points started to market their activities by using the names they are supposed to have under INTERACT 2007 – 2013. Therefore they promoted themselves as INTERACT Point and the name of the location of their premises (Valencia, Vienna, Viborg and Turku).

3.3 INTERACT Points

Priority 1 of the INTERACT Programme (INTERREG Management Support) and Priority 3 Measure 1 (Joint Cooperation Tools) provided for the establishment of a network of 'INTERACT Points' whose role is to work in coordination with the INTERACT Programme Secretariat to deliver development services to the INTERREG community throughout the whole of Europe. Their task is to generate content in terms of best INTERREG management and delivery practices and to enable this to be shared and applied by INTERREG end-users at the programme and project level.

In 2007 the INTERACT Points successfully implemented their work plans by increasingly coordinating their actions. Several activities have been in fact planned by identifying needs common to different geographical areas and to different types of cooperation as differently served by the Points. Three elements have characterized the INTERACT Points delivery structure: 1) the winding down at the end of 2006 of the INTERACT Point located in Sweden redistributed the tasks and the responsibilities for the communications policy to the INTERACT Secretariat and partially to each single INTERACT Point; 2) in anticipation of the application of the new INTERACT II model a geographical approach was followed by the Points which collaborated more closely with programmes located in specific cooperation areas; 3) the INTERACT Point Valencia widened its portfolio of activities and started offering training and information services as the other Points.

During 2007 the INTERACT Points have operated in the whole EU territory serving all INTERREG Programmes. Following the last EU enlargement ad hoc services have been provided to Romania and Bulgaria. Furthermore special attention has been paid to cooperation at the external borders and the implementation of the ENPI programmes at Eastern and Southern borders. The most successful type of activity organised and delivered were public events, such as training seminars, workshops and thematic conferences.

In general the themes addressed have largely covered typical issues related to programme management and implementation. Amongst others, programme financial management, Lead Partner principle, fist and second level control, programme winding-up etc... Furthermore in 2007 new issues arose related to the new programming period and as a consequence INTERACT tailored its services to the set up of new structures, new institutional frameworks and the possible use of new legal instruments such as the EGTC.



Overall 4234 participant days⁵ have been delivered (this is a measure of the amount of training and interaction time involved in the services provided – e.g. 40 people attend a 2-day conference, this is 80 participant days) to programme managers.

The INTERACT Points focused on the consolidation of a working community and made up networks of professionals in the field of project and financial management, communications and information, etc. Therefore larger room was devoted to typical working sessions rather than wide information activities.

In 2007 in fact only one major wide conference was organised in Budapest in March. In cooperation with the Hungarian Government and the European Commission the purpose of the conference was to inform about the state of submission and approval of the various programmes as well as sharing different views and opinions on the application of the Structural Funds Regulations. In addition it is also worthwhile mentioning the INTERREG IIIC concluding conference held in Lisbon.

The following sub-chapters give an overview per Priority and Measure of the targeted activities and the related outputs delivered at the end of the year by the INTERACT Points. It highlights relevant factors which influenced their performances and also contains a summary of the principal features of the INTERACT Points based on the Work Plan 2007. It finally gives an overview of the financial progress made.

It is finally appropriate to signal that during 2007 the INTERACT Points have been considerably involved in the process of preparation of the new INTERACT programme for the period up to 2013. The largest part of the Communications Group meetings organised has been therefore devoted to the preparation and set up of the new programme and turned to become Coordinators' Group meetings. The preparatory process was led by the Managing Authority with the support of the INTERACT Secretariat in view of the discussion and the decisions to be taken by the MSC Members⁶.

In 2007 the INTERACT Points increased their financial performance and managed to spend on average up to 89% of their budget⁷. The table below gives this information per INTERACT Point.

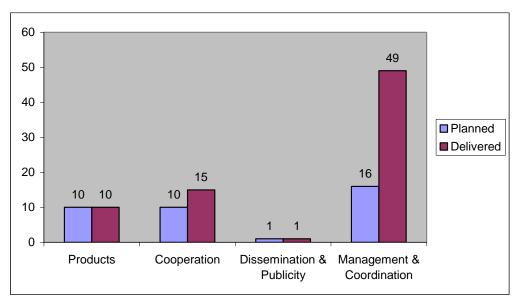
3.3.1 INTERACT Point Valencia – Outputs delivered

It has been a year of transition for the INTERACT Point based in Valencia (Spain). Particular emphasis was given to the differentiation of activities as compared to previous years and to the widening of the portfolio of services. The Point in fact started to carry-out so called "cooperation activities" as the other INTERACT Points. Public events have been organised together with the colleagues of the Secretariat and the Points to smoothly move to self organised events in the second part of the year.

Building on the experience gathered by the Programme actors in the previous years, three main categories of activities have been identified and delivered:

- 1. Activities handed-over by other INTERACT Points, namely promotion and communication
- 2. Activities organised and conducted by the Point itself, namely in the South West of Europe
- 3. Activities organised jointly with other INTERACT Points

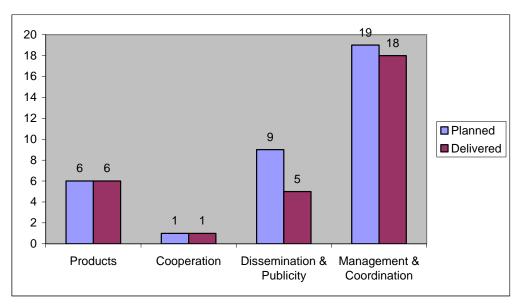


3.3.2 INTERACT Point IIIC Coordination – Outputs delivered

The objective of the INTERACT Point IIIC Coordination (IIIC COORD) is to keep the implementation of the INTERREG IIIC programme consistent across the four IIIC zones – North, East, South and West. The INTERREG IIIC North Programme, located in Rostock, acts as Lead Partner of a consortium consisting of four Programmes with management bodies based in Rostock, Vienna, Valencia and Lille respectively.

This 2007 was the last year of implementation of joint activities amongst the programmes as the interregional cooperation has moved to an integrated approach and delivery under the INTERREG IV C programme.

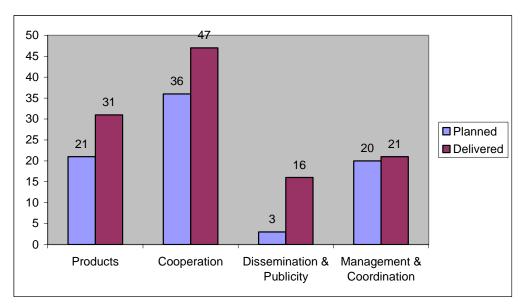
3.3.3 INTERACT Point Viborg – Outputs delivered

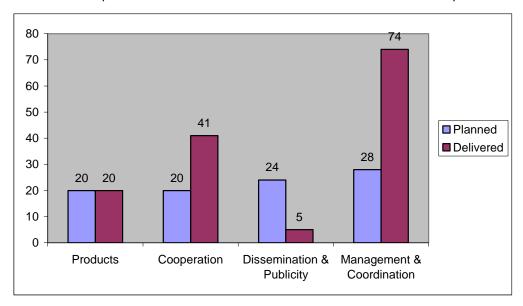
3.3.4 INTERACT Point Vienna – Outputs delivered

The INTERACT Point has a specific geographical and thematic mandate which refers particularly to management and development of INTERREG Programmes in the countries involved in the last two EU enlargements and their cooperation with the old EU 15. The Point devotes also resources towards the programmes dealing with cooperation at the EU North, East and South external borders.

In 2007 the activities have been increasingly coordinated with the other INTERACT Points and the INTERACT Programme Secretariat in view of a higher degree of integration and quality standard in all areas served.

As for the other INTERACT Points resources have also focused on the preparation of the new INTERACT II Programme. Therefore the activity line "Management and Coordination" reports considerable actions taken. This year has marked the phasing out of the legal cooperation with the INTERACT Point branch office in Turku which is expected to become an independent operational Unit under INTERACT II.

3.3.5 Coordinators' Group Meetings in 2007

In 2007 the INTERACT Points, the INTERACT Programme Secretariat and the Managing Authority regularly met in the context of the Coordinators' group meetings. This group derives from the experience of the Communications Group which has operated regularly during the years to discuss communications related issues as well as programme management issues. However in view of the preparation of the INTERACT II Programme for the period 2007 - 2013, the Coordinators of the different offices started to meet regularly and therefore the Group became a natural forum and meeting environment.

Several meetings have been held in different locations (Viborg, Turku, Vienna, Brussels, Valencia) in order to prepare the documents to be submitted for discussion and future approval by the INTERACT Monitoring and Steering Committee.

During the second part of the year the meetings focused also on the preparation of the 2008 Annual Work Plan as it was regularly submitted for approval to the Monitoring and Steering committee in October.

3.3.6 Communications Group Meetings 2006

As described in the Programme Complement, the INTERACT Communications Group serves as a permanent internal task force and think-tank set up by the INTERACT Programme Secretariat as the vehicle for coordination. In 2007, the Communications Group changed its role from one which addressed a wider range of issues within the programme (which was dealt with by the Coordinators Group) and solely addressed Communication Issues. In 2007 the Communications Group met twice.

Both Communications Group meetings dealt with the development of the INTERACT Website and were held in Vienna. The meetings focussed on the usability of the INTERACT Website and steps to be taken for future developments for INTERACT II.

This amount includes accrued expenditures and open commitments from the budget 2006 for an amount of EUR 15 660.34. This amount will be added to the budget 2007 in order to enable the expenditure.



3.4 INTERACT Projects

This chapter reports at aggregated level on the activities conducted and the services delivered during 2007 by the INTERACT Projects' partners throughout Europe. A detailed description of the projects' main achievements in 2007 and those realised during the whole implementing period is presented in the Annex to this document.

In 2007 fourteen projects have been operating under Priority 2 (INTERREG development/ local and regional initiatives) and four projects under Priority 3 Measure 2 (INTERREG participation at the external borders) of the INTERACT Programme. Three projects operating under Priority 2 had finished in 2006 and had submitted their Final Project Reports: INTERPROCEDURE (June 2006), PACINTERREG (December 2006) and INTER-A (December 2006). Fourteen projects finished in 2007 and most of them submitted their Final Project Reports: IONAS (March 2007), Pro Monte (April 2007), COMPART (April 2007), Re-Act (May 2007), LARA INTERREG Tool Box (June 2007), Intermed (June 2007), Time 2C (June 2007), FIMIP (June 2007), Tran.S.E.A. (July 2007), ALSO (October 2007) EuroTool (November 2007).

This part of the Implementation Report is mostly based on the Project Final Reports submitted by the finalised projects⁹. Four projects will conclude in 2008 and have sent the Annual Final Report 2007: Border Crossing (March 2008), Frontiers (May 2008) INTERFORM (May 2008) and SPARC (June 2008). It has to be stressed that one project (INTERMED¹⁰) was underperforming and did not deliver neither the final report 2006 nor the project final report due to internal management problems of the Lead Partner.

In the table below as compared to 2006 table the planned and achieved output indicators have been revised and updated as a consequence of the approval of time extension and also allocation of extra ERDF for some Projects under Priority 2. These figures include the achieved outputs of the 16 concluded projects (excluding INTERMED that didn't submit any report and therefore no indicators are available) and the 4 still ongoing projects.

To implement and improve the operational aspects of the projects the INTERACT Programme Secretariat organized on the 19th and 20th of February 2007 in Vienna a Lead Partner Seminar, which focused on the reporting templates and procedures the INTERACT Projects had to use and follow in the final reporting phase. This presentation session proved very valuable and this has been seen in the enhanced quality of the delivered reports.

The following information presents an overall picture of projects' activities highlighting in quantitative terms the critical mass of INTERACT outputs delivered¹¹. A comparison between planned and achieved output indicators can be found in the tables below.

Not all projects managed to submit their final report within the expected contractual period.

The Annex to this document does not include the fact sheet of the INTERACT project INTERMED:

Management and coordination activities were particularly relevant in the initial phase of projects implementation, considering their strategic importance in the starting of the Project Life Cycle (see INTERACT Programme Annual Implementation Report 2005). In the closure phase of the projects they are still considered of particular importance. Given that the majority of the INTERACT projects has now gained the final stage, some of the most succeeding examples of this management-related category are highlighted here below.

The project ALSO set up different project bodies: the ALSO Secretariat, the ALSO Scientific Committee and the ALSO Working Groups. The ALSO Secretariat elaborated an internal communication procedure and a financial reporting manual for the project partners. All the Working Groups worked together under the coordination of the respective strand partners to draft project ideas, using the ALSO tools (Evaluation Model, Good Practice Manual, Checklist and Software) created by the ALSO Scientific Committee, to verify at a first stage at what extent an INTERREG project contributes to the achievement of the objectives of the Lisbon Strategy. Each Working Group was charged with the responsibilities of operative, administrative and financial reporting towards the ALSO Secretariat, during the whole duration of the activities.

The Iq-Train project Steering Group created cooperative project bodies: the Iq-Train Secretariat, the Iq-Train Learning Organisation, the Network-Partners and the External Process Moderation. The Steering Group, supported by the External Process Moderation, was responsible for the steering of all activities and took decisions for the entire organization. The Iq-Train Secretariat (Landesakademie Lower Austria - LAK) acted as focal point of communication: management of the project website and publication of the results of the learning events. The Iq-Train Secretariat was also the help-desk that offered advise and support to participants and persons responsible of training sessions. The Learning Organization had the role to guide and inform external executive partners and internal participating partners.

Of particular relevance are the Contact Points established by the project LARA INTERREG Tool Box in the Czech Republic, Netherlands, Hungary and Poland with the objective to make them self-sustainable in the upcoming years. These Contacts Points are hosted by the project partners and they work as front offices (one staff person) that collect the inquiries or requests and either responds immediately or furthers the demands to the project managers and experts. The main purpose of these LARA Contact Points is to spread information and contact in the target countries addressing the local and regional governments and elaborate new project ideas.

INTERACT Resources are now available to INTERREG practitioners. This particular investment of the INTERACT Projects has generated many outputs in 2005, 2006 and 2007 and has complemented outputs delivered by the INTERACT Points and the INTERACT Programme Secretariat already in 2004. It has therefore strengthened the INTERACT Programme delivery as a whole. Some relevant examples are mentioned below.

More studies (32) were realised than planned (25) representing a unique chance to confront regional and local actors with INTERREG Project implementation related issues and providing possible solutions for sound management and performance.

It is worthwhile mentioning the "Vademecum of Good practices and useful tools for the promotion of the innovation in the SMEs and the management of cooperation projects" published by the project INTER-A, which increases the efficiency and adaptability of the INTERREG programmes and future Territorial cooperation programmes to territorial needs, including the analysis of potential overlapping, inconsistencies and synergies with other SMEs support programmes.

The project INTERPROCEDURE published a final document "Key issues to Europe", which contains solutions for improving the application and articulation of the regulations on expenditure eligibility in the framework of the INTERREG programmes.



The project FIMIP elaborated a guide in English and in Spanish referring to the best practices in Financial Management on INTERREG projects and including the recommendations that provide solutions and practical tools for solving common financial issues.

The project Time 2C produced two thematic publications on Maritime Cross-Border Cooperation "Guide of Best Practices on Maritime INTERREG Projects" and "Towards a Joint Cooperation Strategy" for creating synergies and transfer of know-how on maritime projects throughout the whole INTERREG programmes and for improving the better governance of INTERREG maritime projects. These studies were used as a Dutch input for the Green Paper on maritime policy.

Furthermore It is worthwhile mentioning the publication of the project IONAS "Towards the Environmental Management Systems in the Adriatic and Ionian area", related to the international workshop on environmental management methods entitled "Sharing of knowledge about environmental management methods in port areas – Problems concerning dredging and waste management", that was added as an extra activity.

The project Pro Monte created the Alpine Space Toolbox that presents ideas and recommendations to improve European Territorial Cooperation Programmes considering the specific territorial needs for the sustainable development of the Alpine areas.

The project Re-Act realised two regional information manuals with the title "INTERREG in the Emilia-Romagna Region: the implementation of the Community Initiative on trans-European cooperation in the 2000-2006 period" and "INTERREG in IIIB-IIIC in Lombardy".

The production of material sets (149) and handbooks (35) is strictly related to training and transfer of know-how in general and in 2007 projects consolidated and improved their experience in knowledge generation. All the useful information materials delivered for discussion at conferences were consequently made available for a wider public on each project website.

The project PACINTERREG published a Handbook on Regional Structure for future stakeholders (based on the recommendations of different INTERREG JTS) to help the creation of strong and steady partnerships which are often the prerequisite basis to lead cooperation projects to a successful end.

The project ALSO set up the ALSO package "ALSO Manual for Projects Assessment: looking for guiding principles", which includes the three main ALSO products (ALSO Evaluation Model, ALSO Good Practice Manual and ALSO Checklist) for evaluating INTERREG projects results and impact and orienting the new generation of European Territorial Cooperation projects towards the objectives of the Lisbon and Gothenburg Strategy¹³.

Important to mention is the model for training seminars addressed to project managers elaborated by the Project Re-Act based on the "Regional Practitioner Guidelines for Good Project Management in the Territorial Cooperation Objectives", a tool kit that arms future project managers with a series of useful tips and guidelines for more efficient projects¹⁴.

The ALSO Evaluation Model indicates one successful project and three pilot projects of the three INTERREG Strands (project already finished at the time of the analysis) for each Lisbon and Gothenburg objective selected.

Even in this category the projects under Priority 3 Measure 2 produced more material sets (42) than planned (30). This is the case of the Project Iq-Train developed two tools: a 'FLC-glossary' and a 'FLC-dictionary'.

It is worthwhile to mention the English/Greek glossary on European Territorial Cooperation, realised by the project PACINTERREG, collecting the most common terminology on that topic.

For the project Tran S.E.A. the finalisation of the "SEA Guidelines" referring to the European Strategic Environmental Assessment Directive, represents the most important project output. It will be available in hard copies, in CD-Rom and for download on the project website. Worthwhile was also the creation of a web-based helpdesk service, aimed to support INTERREG actors in the elaboration of qualitative good Strategic Environmental Assessments (SEA). In particular the service, via email or through the project website, is available for giving a first evaluation on the SEA applications proposed by INTERREG programme and projects. This helpdesk will last also after the project conclusion, through an automatic reply service, that will be managed by the LP with internal resources and external expertise.

The newsletters (46) represent the main tool when addressing a wider and often not specialised public. Those delivered by the INTERACT Projects contribute to a great extent to the involvement of new actors in INTERREG namely at regional and local level.

The Lead Partner of the project INTERFORM disseminated bilingual (English and French) newsletters 'Lettre Espaces transfrontaliers' - 'Letter cross-border territories' that give information about the INTERACT programme and the INTERFORM project.

The project COMPART published 3 newsletters with the following topics: general issues about European Territorial Cooperation (January 2006); the reform process of EU's external aid: cross-border cooperation under ENPI and IPA, and the role of Local Authorities in the new thematic programmes (April 2006); From territorial cooperation to Euro-regions (June 2006).

The online interactive dimension of the products is represented by the Web resources (17) which are individual added-value web features made available on a website (e.g. eForum, FAQ section, searchable database of Projects, good practices or thematic experts). These products are proved to be the more accessible ones and considered of great impact from INTERACT Projects' clientele.

The database of the project PACINTERREG is based on searchable maps of INTERREG projects and it allows to research the projects by themes and by zone (thematically and territorially), comparing the divergences and convergences between programmes and projects and facilitating the generation of new partnerships. Also the goal of the database created by the project Eurotool was to facilitate the search for new project partners in all European regions for the programming period 2007-2013. The database specifies the entities-authorities responsible for the area of cross-border, transnational and interregional cooperation at European, national and regional level, including non-EU Member States and external borders.

The project Tran S.E.A. created an Expertise System based on interactive FAQ, aimed to support INTERREG actors identifying best practices and benchmarking analysis, through the promotion of new approaches, experiences and know-how on the application of SEA.

INTERREG Programme and Project managers become users of the **INTERACT cooperation activities** and develop their own capacities and those of their organisations. This process is supposed to ultimately lead them to change or refine practices in order to enhance the quality of INTERREG Programmes and Projects.

The pedagogic dimension of the INTERACT Programme is typically represented by both training seminars (87) and workshops of discussion (81). Such activities have been organised in



2007 in many countries and addressed various beneficiaries coming mainly from regional and local administrations but also from the non-profit sector (NGOs, Association of entrepreneurs, Universities and research Institutes).

The project Time 2C organised 3 master classes concerning different topics: "Maritime Economy", "Maritime Transport and Infrastructure", "Coastal Development, Water management and Environment" for representatives of regional and local authorities, including a promotional campaign.

The project PACINTERREG organised the Summer University, consisting in a Master Class for "Facilitating the meetings between political decision maker", for implementing the contacts and the exchanges of information and know-how between national and local authorities.

5 transnational seminars were organised by the project Pro Monte, where different mountain issues were discussed: the territorial cooperation into the Carpathian mountains (in Slovakia); the efficiency of the Interreg programmes A and B in the Alps (in Italy); the common problems in Mediterranean mountains (in Spain); the cooperation between the mountain areas of Mediterranean islands (in Greece); the sustainable development of mountain regions (in Bulgaria).

The project LARA Tool Box held trainer courses and end-user courses addressed to the target countries. 9 trainers were trained in Poland, Hungary and the Czech Republic and these trainers trained over 60 municipal officers while in the Netherlands over 30 officers were trained.

The project CULTPLAN realised 2 local workshops (in Italy and Greece) addressed to local stakeholders involved in European projects for contributing to the promotion of the cultural perspective on a local project level.

The INTERACT Projects have organised 34 international, national and regional conferences where actual themes of cooperation were discussed. These addressed, amongst others, themes like Good Governance of Programmes in cross border cooperation, generation of project ideas in maritime cooperation areas and in the mountain areas, cross strand fertilisation of management techniques, Lisbon and Gothenburg priorities as currently targeted by INTERREG Projects, etc...

All the finalized projects organized final conferences for presenting the achieved results and new project ideas to be developed in the coming Territorial Cooperation programming phase.

It is also worthwhile to mention the unplanned dissemination conference (called Project Factory) organised by the project INTER-A within the XV EBN (European Business and Innovation Centres Network) Annual Congress, during which a workshop and a stand were organised for presenting the main project results and methodologies. The Innovation Tool Database created by the project is still included on the EBN website.

The project Iq-Train organized 2 Open Space Conferences (OSC) based on the hypothesis that if the participants by themselves design the event, the issues treated will be of high importance and the results will be of higher quality. The individual needs were related to thematic topics, which have been sorted on the level of importance and impact on INTERREG programmes and projects.

One of the project partners of CULTPLAN organized an international symposium including international experts dealing with planning culture and reflecting previous project achievements on that topic. Objectives are to deepen the understanding of theoretical basics, exchange experience and knowledge with international experts, networking with European partners and to communicate project results.



The project Euro Tool organised a final forum for connecting people coming from all over Europe interested in European Territorial Cooperation programmes, responding to the main project goal that is to facilitate the search for partners in other European regions, particularly those that are geographically remote.

To increase the professionalism of the organisations and individuals involved in cross-border cooperation the project INTERFORM organised methodological seminars about the coordination of public policies in cross-border areas and 3 Cross-Border Discussions were realised under the title "Culture and citizenship in cross-border cooperation".

The INTERACT Projects contributed to disseminate INTERREG and INTERACT results by participating in exhibitions (73). These are intended as events organised (e.g. fairs, conferences, directoria) mainly by Programme management authorities where an INTERACT Project stand was set up or a presentation given. The INTERACT projects participated to more promotional activities than foreseen.

The LP of the project EX-INT realised 5 study tours round in Europe (Berlin, Chmenitz, Marseille, Cyprus, Prague) for the dissemination activities and know how exchanges for future cooperation. These tours were preceded by a benchmarking report in order to schedule and organise the destinations.

Alongside the training course the project LARA Toolbox made available an advisory service to assist local authorities in preparing project applications for the new programming period. Between the different training courses experts visit the participants and work with them on the development of project proposal.

The INTERACT Programme relies very much on the generation of information on INTERREG and the dissemination of results achieved in the different Strands of cooperation. This is why **Dissemination and Communication** activities play a crucial role also at INTERACT Project level where Leaders and Project Partners have allocated relevant resources. These activities were particularly important and considerably improved in 2007 because the Projects, already in their mature phase, contributed to promote the INTERACT brand at regional and local level raising awareness and expectations.

By December 2007 20 INTERACT Projects launched their Web sites. Many projects constantly developed their web pages, adding interactive sections. They represent useful platforms where project outputs can be published and are free available, becoming more and more significant sources of information about INTERREG Programmes in different Members States. They host and promote material in 12 different languages and serve clients in their own native and most of the times working languages.

The ALSO website for example has been enriched with new areas like ALSO Library (containing the most important documents on Lisbon Agendas) ALSO people (a blog discussing the main topics of Lisbon issues).

The Media contacts (90) include all efforts made to gain media coverage for an initiative. These efforts have generated articles in newspapers and specialized technical reviews, radio and TV interviews, dissemination of press releases, etc.

During 2007 the promotion of INTERACT passed also through the launch of 32 promotional campaigns and the preparation of 66 sets of marketing tools which are an investment in a visual identity, or marketing materials such as posters, brochures, flyers, panels, etc...

It is worthwhile mentioning the common transnational TV spot produced by PACINTERREG for enhancing the cooperation in the Mediterranean area.



The project ALSO realised the ALSO Photo competition, the ALSO Photo exhibition and Photo Exhibition Catalogue, that represent a reportage on the project activities.

The above listed examples intend to give an overview of INTERACT projects type of activities and are not meant to be exhaustive. However they signal overall a satisfactory performance when cross checking activity reports with financial reports. The project in fact passed from a annual level of financial absorption of 55% (2005) and 65 % (2006) to an average of 85% in 2007 and significantly contributed to the N+2 positive result of the Programme.



3.5 The INTERACT Communications Strategy

The INTERACT Communications Strategy focuses on internal and external components:

- Internal: to facilitate effective management-related communication between the structures which together manage and steer the programme (the Secretariat, MA and MSC) and the structures which ultimately deliver development services to final beneficiaries (the Secretariat and the INTERACT Points).
- External: to reach the wider INTERREG community the end users of the programme's services, a group encompassing both INTERREG programme managers and project participants.

3.5.1 INTERACT Website

Regarding the INTERACT Website, milestones in 2007 included:

- Update of the INTERACT Programme sections, including changes to the team pages and updates to the INTERACT Point and Project pages.
- Update of the FAQ Section "About this site"
- Launch of the Programme Closure section in INTERREG Information.
- Updates to the "Clickable Maps" of each INTERREG programme
- Update of the "2007-2013" section, including a new section "additional information" containing documentation from the Budapest Conference.
- Question & Answer session with DG Regional Policy on the INTERACT Forum
- Launch of the INTERACT E-tool on eligibility (cooperation between INTERACT Point Managing Transition (Turku partner) and INTERACT Programme Secretariat)



3.5.2 Web Statistics

A brief summary of a detailed analysis of the INTERACT Website statistics gives the following results:

57 901 **unique visitors** came to the site in 2007, as determined by typical behaviour of browsers with a non-rotating IP address and including a projection of the true number of visitors with rotating IP addresses. This is compared to 32 289 **in 2006.** A typical visitor examined 10.89 distinct files before leaving the site. A typical visit lasted for 6.07 minutes. Visitors came from 220,671 **distinct internet addresses**. The web server delivered 9,625 unique documents one or more times each as compared to 4 663 in 2006. The INTERACT Website is now linked to by one or more pages found on 3,889 distinct websites.

The following graph shows the number of unique visitors¹⁵ in 2007 compared to 2006

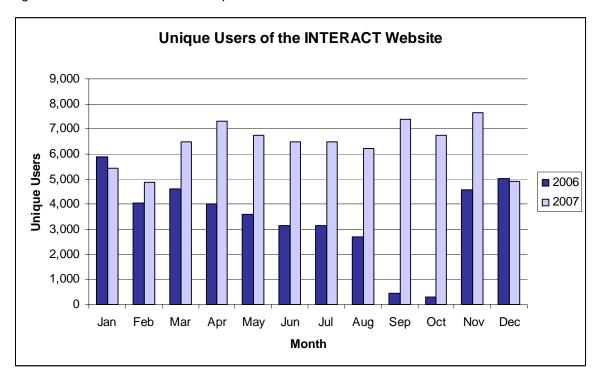


Figure 1: INTERACT Website - Unique Visitors in 2007

3.5.3 Livelink to Confluence

Livelink is a permission-based intranet for different actors ranging from the INTERACT Monitoring and Steering Committee to external experts.

Confluence has replaced LiveLink in December 2008. This new wiki tool will function as the artery of the day-today internal flow of information within INTERACT. With the ability to share, discuss and collaborate online it is more user friendly and allows for greater customisation.

-

A "visit" consists of one or more accesses made by the same visitor, with no more than a certain time interval between accesses. A "unique visitor" is a single, distinct person, visiting the site one or more times.



Confluence also has meant significant budgetary savings for the INTERACT Programme (450 000 .EUR over the course of the next 7 years). A shared calendar is stored in the system as a coordination tool.

All documentation from INTERACT I stored on Livelink has been sorted, archived and moved to Confluence, where applicable. The INTERACT Programme Secretariat uses Confluence in its daily work to share documents with the Managing Authority, the INTERACT Points, INTERACT Projects and as well as the Monitoring and Steering Committee.

3.6 Publicity

The presence of INTERACT in online and paper publications has been satisfying throughout 2007. A selection of documented press-clippings:

- The December 2007 issue of Panorama Magazine included and article on INTERACT.
- Wikipedia now has an entry for INTERACT and European Territorial Cooperation.
- INFOREGIO Site included several news on INTERACT in 2006 in the section "INTERREG III: what's new" (such as the publication of the "Ask the Experts: Q&A session with the European Commission on the INTERACT Forum"

3.6.1 Contact database, Event Registration Tool and Expert Database

The INTERACT Contact Database (IP Information and Animation until September 2006 and then INTERACT Programme Secretariat) and the Expert Database (IP Managing Transition) are searchable databases with contact information on those involved in European regional cooperation.

Thanks to the integration of an online Event Registration Tool by the INTERACT Programme Secretariat the number of data subjects increased immediately to approx 7 000 (from 3 500 in 2006).

The Contact database and Event Registration Tool were both refined in 2007 and are now used by each INTERACT Point and the INTERACT Secretariat for all events.

3.6.2 Disseminators

The INTERACT Programme Secretariat also has a list of disseminators which are contacted to disseminate the INTERACT Programme Secretariat or Programme's activities when needed. The database consists of approx. 50 information disseminators such as Welcomeurope, Infobase Europe and EU Praxis as well as networks and associations such as Association of European Border Regions, Innovating Regions in Europe and European Spatial Planning Research and Information Database. These contacts are not included in the contact database and are used for dissemination of press releases only.



4. Programme financial implementation

This chapter gives an overview of the financial aspects of the INTERACT Programme. Information is provided about allocations and commitments as decided by the INTERACT MSC, payments made by the INTERACT Paying Authority and payments received from the European Commission.

Section 4.1 provides an overview of the programme's financial allocations and commitments as well as the progress made at Priority and Measure level.

Section 4.2 gives a detailed overview of all claims of the Paying Authority and Payments made by the EC since the beginning of the Programme until the end of 2007. Section 4.3 gives an overview of the eligible expenditure certified and reimbursed by the Paying Authority in 2007 per Priority and Measure as well as the level of cumulative expenditure since the beginning of the programme implementation.

Finally section 4.4 gives information about the N+2 situation at the end of 2007 and the positive performance of the INTERACT Programme with regards to the risk of decommitment.

4.1 Financial progress

Table 5 shows the programme financial allocations (per Priority and Measure) as applied in 2007 following the revision approved by the INTERACT MSC in November 2006 and formally accepted by the EC in February 2007.

A shift of an amount of EUR 117 500 total costs (EUR 105 750 ERDF) from Priority 1 Measure 2 to Priority 1 measure 1 was agreed with MSC10-decision 1 on 9 November 2006 (confirmed by the EC on 05.02.2007)

The total allocations and related ERDF shares are also shown in table 6 (columns B and C). This information is completed by the indication of the funds committed with MSC decisions (columns D and E) and ultimately paid out by the Paying Authority by the end of 2007 (columns G and H) as well as the relationships between these items in percentages.

Most of the allocated funds of the Programme are committed. Columns D and E (commitments) show, for INTERACT Programme Secretariat and TA as well as the INTERACT Points and Projects the use of the amounts until end 2007. A higher level of commitment of funds was reached by the programme on the occasion of the INTERACT MSC meeting held in Vienna in March 2008.

4.2 Payments Received

The table underneath shows all financial flows between the Commission and the Paying Authority in relation to the INTERACT Programme, approved 16 December 2002, Commission Reference CCI 2002 RG 16 0 PC 002.

Because of the higher expenditures per year more claims were sent to the EC. The average amount of a claim rose and stabilised at about 1.5 MEURO with a significant positive exception of the last claim submitted in December 2007.

4.3 Payments Processed per Priority and Measure

The level of payment claims has substantially increased in 2007. The claims are processed by the INTERACT Programme Secretariat and forwarded to the Managing Authority and Paying Authority for further evaluation. The processing of reports and payment claims from INTERACT Points and Projects is undertaken by the INTERACT Programme Secretariat, which checks the relevant information and suggests actions to be taken by the Managing Authority and the Paying Authority. The Managing Authority also handles the payment claims from the legal employer and service provider for the INTERACT Programme Secretariat (ÖIR the Austrian Institute for Regional Studies and Spatial Planning), following a procedure in which indicated cost items are subject to approval in advance.

The tables in the following two pages show the amounts actually paid out by the paying Authority per Priority and Measure in 2007 and the total cumulative since the beginning of the programme implementation.

At the beginning of the year the Annual Report 2006 and payment claims of the INTERACT Points and Projects were processed. At the end of the year, the Mid Term Reports 2007 of the INTERACT Points were processed and most Points and Projects also claimed ERDF with Additional Payment Requests. For monitoring and processing purposes, the INTERACT Programme Secretariat relied on management system which was developed in 2006.

4.4 Automatic Decommitment (N+2 Rule)

The ERDF allocation (commitment) to the INTERACT Programme for 2005, which has set the N+2 target for expenditure during 2007 (=N+2) was MEUR 7.429. The N+2 target is cumulative as it also includes the ERDF allocations to 2002, 2003, 2004 and 2005. The cumulative ERDF allocation which had to be spent before the end of 2007 to avoid a decommitment was EUR 20 666 804. This target has been reached and the surplus of EUR 282 263 contributed to reach the 2007 target. This success was also due to an appropriate system of reports and claim processing set up by the Managing Authority and the Paying Authority in strict coordination with the INTERACT Secretariat.

5. Steps Taken to Ensure Quality and Effectiveness of the Programme

2007 was a full year of implementation and delivery during which no major problems have been faced by the programme structures. Both the relations with the clientele (INTERREG programmes and to a limited extent projects) and the programme stakeholders (MSC, MA and EC) were constructive.

The programme performed very well both in financial and activity terms as reported in other chapters of this document. The biggest challenge was the smooth adaptation to a new service delivery model which is going to be fully applied under INTERACT as from 2008. The model envisages a higher focus on specific geographical areas per each of the INTERACT Points. This approach would enable a closer knowledge of the stakeholders' needs and tailor ad hoc services.

During the second semester of the year the INTERACT Points started to apply more and more this approach and coordinated with the INTERACT Secretariat in order to avoid overlapping activities and serve closely INTERREG actors throughout Europe.

In general as in previous years one element which affected programme management and delivery was the turn over of the staff in the Secretariat and in the Points. To this regards INTERACT shares an unfortunate situation similar to other INTERREG programmes in the three Strands. Here below some details as incurred in the different offices and structures.

No formal evaluation of the programme has been conducted in 2007 by the Managing Authority. However the programme progress was constantly monitored and reported to INTERACT MSC Members on the occasion of the meetings. This was done in view of the transition to the new programme and the consequent adaptation to the European Territorial Cooperation objective scenario and the community of stakeholders to relate to.

INTERACT Programme Secretariat

In 2007 on average the Secretariat was understaffed according to the FTE planned and approved by the INTERACT MSC. This was due to the change of the Head of the Secretariat who joined the team in March and the non substitution of the Communications Manager whose role was taken over only last quarter of the year.

Nevertheless the Secretariat managed to respond to the highest level of demands coming from the INTERACT projects which were finalising their activities and therefore preparing the Final Activity and Financila Reports. Time and resources have been also absorbed by the support to the INTERACT managing Authority for the preparation of INTERACT 2007 – 2013.

INTERACT Point Tool Box (Valencia)

Since Mid May 2007 the Coordinator of the INTERACT Point was on sick leave thus the coordination of the activities was partially taken over by an official of the hosting institution (Region of Valencia). The staff were challenged by new tasks depending on the widening of the portfolio of activities assigned to the Point. The delivery of public events in fact accompanied the conception of products and tools.

INTERACT Point IIIC Coordination

No major problems have been encountered during the reporting period. The Communications Officer located in the IIIC West Secretariat was replaced as from July onwards. The IIIC North Secretariat and the Managing Authority have been subject of the "on the spot check" control conducted by a consulting form ad hoc contracted for the purpose of the second level control.



As a consequence this activity absorbed some working time of the staff in order to prepare the appropriate documentation for revision and control.

INTERACT Point Qualification and Transfer (Viborg)

No major problems have been encountered during the reporting period. The Office administrator was on maternity leave and was substituted.

INTERACT Point Managing Transition and External Cooperation (Vienna/Turku)

The INTERACT Point was affected by a turnover in staff as two members left during the first semester of the year. No major problems otherwise have been faced. Some extra work has been devoted to the implementation of the internal administrative and financial procedures as recommended by the outcomes of the "on the spot check conducted in late 2006.

5.1 Financial Control

At the third meeting of the INTERACT Financial Control Group (FCG) held on 19 June 2006 in Brussels the audit methodology (including checklists, audit protocols and other working papertemplates) as well as the sample and the time plan for the INTERACT Programme Audit have been approved according to chapters IV and V of Commission Regulation 438/2001. On this basis the on-the-spot checks for INTERACT Project ALSO and INTEARCT Point IIIC Coordination were convened by the contracted auditor Ernst & Young Germany during 2007.

As regards the results of these checks the external auditor concluded the following: Of the total declared expenses audited – which in total amounts to EUR 654.017,43 - EUR 7.478,6 can be deemed ineligible. For both projects the final financial effect could not be established. While for INTERACT Project ALSO only the amount of EUR 2.251,52 has been put into question, the preliminary financial effect for INTERACT Point IIIC amounts - due to the fact that the audited body did not allocate its overhead and staff costs on the basis of traceable and equitable methods – to EUR 174.532,95. The final financial effect needs to be established in the Follow-up process.

As regards the Follow-up process for all checks convened in 2006 all open findings could be solved during 2007. The final financial effect has become in total EUR 22.084,31 (EUR 227,64 for the Technical Assistance and EUR 21.856,67 for INTERACT Point Managing Transition and External Cooperation). This amount has been deducted from payment claims submitted by the Host Organisation of the Technical Secretariat respectively by the Host of IP MTEC, City of Vienna. The Financial Control Group has been informed about the findings detected in 2006 as well as on the Follow-up measures implemented by the Managing Authority at their meeting on 5 February 2007.

5.2 Programme Management and Steering

The management and steering of the INTERACT Programme is the shared responsibility of:

- the Managing Authority (MA) and Paying Authority (PA),
- the Monitoring and Steering Committee (MSC) and
- the INTERACT Programme Secretariat (IS)

These three structures have worked together to steer and manage the INTERACT Programme.



5.2.1 The Managing and Paying Authorities

The Managing Authority (MA) and the Paying Authority for the INTERACT Programme is the Austrian Federal Chancellery (Bundeskanzleramt der Republik Österreich). There are in total five staff members involved in the programme (2.6 FTE).

The location of the Managing Authority in Austria has proved to be particularly efficient as the whole programme benefited of the experience and skills developed in the Austrian public administration sector. Overall emerged a tendency to operate according to a non-hierarchical approach (State Government and Regions) which fitted appropriately with the INTERACT management structure.

As a consequence the daily management of the programme was outsourced to a dedicated Programme Secretariat and the service delivery shared across a network of INTERACT Points representing the priorities of the wider INTERREG Community Initiative.

In 2007 regular meetings were normally held every two weeks between Managing Authority and INTERACT Programme Secretariat to discuss ongoing issues and prepare formal (MSC) and informal events (e.g. trainings).

At operational level the Paying Authority of INTERACT is supported by the ERP-Fund (state aid institution in Austria on federal level with legal personality status under public law) responsible for the execution of payments to the programme beneficiaries and the provision of administrative support, in particular in relation to the monitoring for the purpose of gathering data pursuant to Art.34(1) of Regulation (EC) No1260/1999.

For all the ERDF funded programmes in Austria, the ERP Fund has established a uniform ERDF Central Monitoring System This system allows monitoring data to be collected and processed on the level of individual projects/operations. For this purpose a data catalogue based on Annex 4 of Council Regulation (EC) 438/2001 is used, which has been, as far as necessary, adapted to the INTERACT programme.

The Paying Authority has also worked in strict coordination with the INTERACT Programme Secretariat. Shared procedures have been consolidated and contributed to reach and overcome the 2007 n+2 target as well as assured appropriate information flow to the body responsible for the Second Level Control and the on the spot checks of Point and Projects.

5.2.2 The Programme Secretariat

The INTERACT Programme Secretariat is contracted and supervised by the Managing Authority. The function of the Secretariat is acting as facilitator, organiser, and information node for the whole programme. As a consequence its tasks go beyond the functions of classical technical secretariats as operating in INTERREG programmes. This is due to the specific nature of INTERACT and the explorative and innovative character of the operations.

In addition to 'Technical Management Functions' in fact, the Secretariat also acts as an implementing body and performs 'Operational Functions' under Priority 1 and Priority 3, Measure 1 of the programme. The latter functions either have a horizontal character or serve the purpose of further development of INTERACT Tasks.

The responsibility of the day-to-day management of the programme stays in the Secretariat, which has been outsourced by the MA to the Austrian Institute for Regional Studies and Spatial Planning and will be operating until June 2008.

In 2007 the staff of the Secretariat partially changed. In particular, the coordination role which was assured ad interim by the Project Manager acting as Coordinator since June 2006 was



finally taken over by a new Head as from April 2007. A new position of Deputy Head was also created in order to ensure continuity as well as improved management and control.

Following the leave of the Communications Manager in April 2007 the Communications officer was finally promoted in the role.

Main Activities in 2007

Even in 2007 a large part of the resources were devoted to the support of the finalisation of the INTERACT projects. Several project steering committee meetings have been attended by the staff of the Secretariat and an ongoing technical support and advice was provided with regards to the use of the INTERACT reporting system and the documentation required.

As in previous year the work with the Points was coordinated via regular meetings and IT communication channels as well as by attending events organised throughout Europe. The pick of the collaboration amongst the different Units was the European wide INTERACT Conference organised in Budapest in collaboration with the Hungarian authorities.

Finally the Secretariat supported regularly the Managing Authority in the process of preparation of the 2007 – 2013 INTERACT Programme by organising laboratory groups, ad hoc meeting of the INTERACT MSC as well as coordinating some external consultants contracted ad hoc.

Here below a brief summary on the activities is presented even if direct involvement must be considered while reading other Chapter of the current document.

Coordination of the INTERACT Points

In 2007 the coordination between the INTERACT Points and the Secretariat improved and started to move towards a new integrated model as possibly envisaged under INTERACT II. Products and services have been conceived and realised in stricter cooperation than previous years and feedback exercises following events have confirmed an overall improvement in quality and a higher level of satisfaction amongst the INTERACT users.

Documents and information have been shared via the INTERACT management system which contributed to provide ongoing updated material to all INTERACT managers. A shared calendar of event has also been developed which served to plan events in various locations throughout Europe and avoid duplication of efforts. These events have been planned very often in cooperation with the INTERACT MSC Members concerned.

5.2.3 Technical Assistance (TA) and level of expenditures in 2007

The INTERACT Programme Secretariat activities are financed out of the Technical Assistance budget and Priority 1 as well as Priority 3 Measure 1 of the INTERACT Programme. The TA is respectively made of TA1 which finances the Secretariat staff and overhead costs and TA2 intended for the typical Technical Assistance functions.

In 2007 as a general remark the Secretariat did not spend the whole budget planned. The total difference between planned and actual costs for 2007 amounts to a surplus of EUR 268 470. In general the level of expenditure was lower than expected with regards to the implementation of activities. The main reasons are the following:

- Staff costs were EUR 63 000 lower than planned. Because of turnover of staff the INTERACT Secretariat did not work the whole year at full capacity (see above in 5.4.2);
- Material costs were considerably lower than planned (135 000) because some commitments from 2006 were also used in 2007; budgets for graphic design, translation, printing and training were less used and on some occasions economy of scale was made;
- The use of external experts was EUR 39 000 less than planned since IT experts were contracted for a lower amount and some activities were conducted by the staff of the Secretariat:
- Finally some funds originally allocated in Priority 4.2 (Technical Assistance) for studies (EUR 16 000) and computer systems (EUR 13 000) were not used.

The unspent amount has been carried forward to the year 2008 in order to finance the activities of the first semester. The following table shows the Secretariat financial progress in 2007. It has two distinct parts: 1) the costs section per budget line and 2) the sources of funding coming from TA1 and 2, Priority 1 and Priority 1 and Measure 3.1.

The Monitoring and Steering Committee (MSC)

The Monitoring and Steering Committee (MSC) strategically manages the programme and takes ultimate decisions on all issues affecting programme implementation. It undertakes tasks of the Monitoring Committee and the Steering Committee mentioned in Article 35 of Council Regulation (EC) no 1260/1999 and in points 28 and 29 of the INTERREG Guidelines. Its overall task is to supervise the quality and effectiveness of implementation and accountability of the programme operations. It is responsible for overall strategic management, monitoring of the INTERACT Programme and the allocation of funds.

The MSC consists of one to two (exceptionally three) representatives from each Member State. These are often the National INTERREG co-ordinators. With the enlargement of the European Union on 1 January 2007 the former observers from accession states became full members of the MSC which thus increased to 27 members. Norway and Switzerland continued to participate and contribute to the programme as associated states.

In 2007 the Monitoring and Steering Committee met twice. The co-chairs during 2007, along with the Managing Authority of the INTERACT Programme, were Finland and Germany. In 2007 the MSC meetings took place back to back with the Drafting Group meetings which focused on the preparation of INTERACT 2007 – 2013. In general meeting have been highly attended though in Turku the quorum for taking formal decisions was missed for one participant (in INTERACT the quorum is particularly challenging given the 27 +2 Member States involved).

5.3 Further Steps Taken to Ensure Quality and Effectiveness of the Programme

Quality has been at the centre of the programme delivery in 2007. As explained in previous chapters quality was assured by the coordination of the services as delivered by the INTERACT Points in different areas of Europe. The degree of coordination of the different feedback collected increased and outcomes were used in order to improve the quality of the services.

The activities have been monitored and assessed also on the basis of the data reported in the INTERACT management system by the INTERACT Points and Secretariat and the relevant documentation stored in live link (the document management system). The system was further developed by integrating different database (e.g. experts, participants to events). The Secretariat and the Managing Authority have extensively used the system to process payment requests and monitor the financial and physical progress of INTERACT Projects and Points.

Project report templates allow in fact INTERACT Points and Projects to feed the system from remote with data concerning financial and physical progress. It also allows the Secretariat to keep track of indicators as described in the INTERACT Programme enhanced indicators framework and clustered at programme level in the Operational Programme Document.



6. Compatibility with Community Policies and Overall Coordination

The Managing Authority has taken, where applicable and within the scope of the Membership Agreement, appropriate measures within the framework of the assistance to ensure conformity with Community policies (e.g. subsidy contract provisions, eligibility criteria for project applications, rules of procedures for MSC), including the rules on competition, state aid rules, policy on the award of public contracts. Furthermore in INTERACT the following two items are particularly considered with regards to compliance to Community Policies and rules:

Information and Communication Technologies and the Information Society

INTERACT uses a web-based interactive communications system and is a pioneer in the use of information technology for the coordination of a European-wide Programme.

■ Equal Opportunities for Men and Women

In order to be eligible for funding, projects under this Programme must take into account equal opportunities for men and women. The INTERACT Points and the INTERACT Programme Secretariat have a balanced representation of men and women.
